THURSDAY, APRIL 19. SHENKS FERRY. Shenks Ferry is a premier spot for spring wildflowers near Conestoga, southern Lancaster County. The Trout Lily picture on the first page was taken at Shenks. You might expect to see hundreds of Trillium. We have chosen a Thursday, because on weekends in April, it is extremely crowded. If you have never been, it is a must see. Many of us enjoy going every year! The trail is easy walking above a beautiful creek. The road in is rough and the parking is minimal. We will meet at the Conestoga Wagon Restaurant in Conestoga at 10 am. Some may want to arrive early for coffee and pie. We will then car pool to the site. Those who want to carpool with Michael from his home in Wayne, should contact Michael Brooks at 610-293-0693 or mbrooks@wcupa.edu and be there at 8:30. Bring a lunch or eat at Conestoga Wagon after the walk. If using a GPS, put in the town of Conestoga, NOT Shenks Ferry.

Directions:

- Take 202 South to 30 Bypass West
- Stay on Route 30 until Gap, PA
- At the light, turn left onto Route 41
- Turn right onto Route 741 (the tower is on your left)
- Stay on 741 when it turns to the right west of Strasburg, PA.
- Drive past Willow Street, PA (Routes 272 and 222)
- When 741 turns to the right at Marticville Rd., drive straight ahead, staying on Long Lane.
- Turn left at the first light onto New Danville Pike

Drive to the town of Conestoga and meet the DVFWS group at Conestoga Wagon Restaurant.

SATURDAY MAY 5. LEASER LAKE. Leaser Lake is a man-made lake, great for fishing and kayaking. It offers beautiful views of "Blue Mountain" and familiar wildflowers of spring. Some plants to see are Showy Orchid, Miterwort, Fringed Polygala and Royal Fern. Last year the trip to Leaser Lake was very rainy, but the three who went anyway felt it worth repeating. - Take interstate route 78 west of Allentown.
- Exit off to route 143 north at Lenhartsville.
- Follow route 143 north 8 miles thru Wanamakers.
- Take a left onto Ontelaunee Trail and follow this road around to the north shore.
- The boat launch parking will be on the left.



SATURDAY, JUNE 2, MONOCACY HILL. Monocacy Hill Recreation Area is preserved by Monocacy Hill Conservation Association. It is wooded with many trails. Our docent will be Susan Munch, retired botany professor from Albright College. She is an expert in many areas, but today's hike will concentrate on ferns. Last time we were there, she showed us the elusive climbing fern. Contact person for this hike is Michael Brooks

Directions:

- Route 422 starts from Route 202 just west of King of Prussia. Drive north on Route 422.
- Continue on Route 422 when it ceases to be a limited access highway.
- Just after it crosses Route 662. You will see a diner on your right and a little later a Wawa on your left. (Stop at Wawa if you want to use the facilities or buy water.)
- Keep driving until you pass a stop light at Monocacy Creek Road. Once you pass it, keep your eye out for Hill Road on the right. It's a fairly modest little road. Turn right onto Hill Road.
- Drive to the top of the hill and at the Y, turn left unto Geiger Road.
- The parking lot for the preserve is on your left.
- Note: If you are coming from the north on 422, do a U-turn at the Monocacy Creek Road traffic light. Then keep your eye out for Hill Road on the right.

SATURDAY, JUNE 30, STONELEIGH. Stoneleigh, A Natural Garden, is a 42 acre estate in Villanova donated by the Haas Family to Natural Lands Trust in 2016, opening to the public this May. Be one of the first to see this beautiful property. We will have a docent-led tour of the gardens and main house starting at 10 am. There are paved paths accessible for people of all abilities. Restrooms, picnic pavilions and parking available. There is a \$15 fee per person for the guided tour with a minimum of 10 and a maximum of 20. Directions: 1829 E. County Line Road, Villanova, PA

- Get to the intersection of Route 30 and Route 320. Turn north on 320, (N. Spring Mill Road.) If you come from Route 476 it will be a left turn. If you come from Philadelphia turn right, but turn north.
- Pass Villanova University buildings on both sides. Cross a bridge over the train tracks and pass the train station on your right.
- Turn left on the next street -- County Line Road.
- After a very short distance turn into the Stoneleigh parking lot.
- It is possible to walk the short distance from the Villanova train station to Stoneleigh but there are no sidewalks. I would rather those coming by train send me, Michael, an e-mail (mbrooks@wcupa.edu) or a text message (610-293-0693) and I will pick you up at the station.

Suggestions for other field trips included Mt Cuba in the fall and Leaser Lake in Lehigh County.

Program: Following a short break for refreshments, John Scott presented the program - The 2007 Joint Trip to Texas and Southern Arkansas of the British Pteridological Society and DVFWS. John showed his remarkably fine photographs and told interesting stories about eleven days of extensive travels to many Texas State Parks, botanical gardens and private gardens to see ferns in a wide variety of natural and garden settings.

Guided Tour: Following the program, Jess Slade, Morris Arboretum's Natural Lands Horticulturist who manages the woodland and restored wetland, guided us through these areas and the Fernery with 10 who stayed to see and learn about the history and management of these special areas of the Arboretum. Due to the cold March, there were no wildflowers showing their colors. We identified mostly wetland trees and shrubs and in the woodlands saw evergreen Wood Fern and Christmas Fern. The Fernery was magnificently beautiful and warm!
